#### Task 1: The first cars EYFS, KS1 and KS2

This is the Museum's 1899 Wolseley Voiturette Prototype.

We call it The Owl as its registration is OWL 707.

Look at this picture of a car from over 100 years ago. Does it look like car today? Tell an adult or partner all of the things that you think are different or missing from this car that modern cars have. **Clue: Do you think it can go out at night?** 





Now have a look at the kind of road the Owl might have driven on. What **materials** do you think it is made from? Write as many words as you can to describe the road and what it is made from around the picture. E.g. Muddy.

What do you think might happen to the driver and passenger of the Owl if they drove on a road like this? Why?



## Task 2: Spot the difference – EYFS, KS1 (KS2 task on page 5)

#### **Early Motoring Clothing**

Early motorists did not look like motorists today. Cars looked different 100 years ago and motorists had to wear special clothing. Early motor cars, which were only for the wealthy, had lots of \_\_\_\_\_\_\_to modern cars and road surfaces were very basic.

ride in one could be rathe	r breezy and	Therefore, the first motorists
chose to wear thick, leath	er driving	_ that came down to their ankles to
keep them	and dry in wintry	

Also, Victorian and Edwardian cars often did not have \_\_\_\_\_\_ at the front and the first roads were made from dirty, dusty mud and \_\_\_\_\_\_. As a result of this, when cars drove down clay roads, clouds of dust would have been thrown up into the air! This meant that when they were driving, even though it was a sunny day, drivers could not see where they were going. Consequently, the drivers would have to wear \_\_\_\_\_\_ to keep the dust out of their eyes.



Whenever early motorists drove their cars during the winter, they put on thick \_\_\_\_\_\_ around their necks. This helped them to keep themselves warm because the first cars did not have heaters, In addition to this, scarves helped to keep their clothes clean.
